


# **Much Ado About Nothing**

I here hasn't been a new edition of the *Northwoods News* in way too long. Despite the hard work of many, there has been NO news to report, proving that no news is not necessarily good news. Fortunately, it looks like that's about to change.

The Board spent the summer and early fall working with the Town of Lake Luzerne to lay the groundwork for the tax district to fund our much-needed dam repairs. Unfortunately, political mayhem broke out during a highly contested election for Town Supervisor and several Board positions, as well as the resignation of the Town Attorney. Gratefully, things seem to have calmed down and we have again renewed our efforts to get some financial assistance for the dam project. We are working with the Town of L. Luzerne, they seem committed to getting this done but it will be a long process. We will move forward with the repairs once we are confident of the funding of the project.

We also explored other options for raising funds. Dues have always been our main source of income. Historically we have been lax on those members who chose not to pay their dues. The NWA will actively make every effort to collect dues from ALL our residents.

Logging our common woodlands is an important source of revenue for the NWA. This year we worked with Saratoga Land Management and their forester and loggers. They harvested on Beech Mt. and we

realized \$14,000 income for the Northwoods treasury. Further logging is scheduled to start this summer. This money will be targeted for Lake Management, specifically the control of the aquatic vegetation which has gotten out of control lately.

The Board will continue to pursue the formation of a tax district which would guarantee that all members pay their fair share for dam repairs. In the meantime we hope that every family will do their part by paying dues annually.

#### Where Do Your Dues Go?

At the September General Membership meeting the members in attendance voted unanimously to raise Northwoods dues to \$250 per year. The increase was deemed necessary to keep up with the inflation of our regular expenses.

Some believe Northwoods dues are used to fund parties and social events. The truth is that NWA did contribute \$5 per member in good standing who attended the Holiday Party. This is a small thank you for the support, and recognition of the hard work of our many volunteers. The picnic has paid for itself thanks to the \$5 entry fee, proceeds from the 50/50, and the generous contributions of dishes by our members.

The mission of the Northwoods Association is to maintain, enhance and protect over 750 acres of property for the benefit and recreation of its members. As a member you benefit from the great recreational opportunities that our lakes and forest provide. Think about it, you can paddle, fish, swim, hike, snowshoe, ski, hunt, ride, or just sit and enjoy the views. All you have to do is step outside and go! These benefits also greatly enhance your property values as witnessed by the bidding wars and excellent prices for the properties that have sold recently. All these benefits come at considerable cost, and this is where your dues go.

- Property taxes on Northwoods property are \$3300 annually.
- Liability and Dam insurance has doubled in recent years to almost \$9000 annually.
- Property and lake management averages \$4000 annually. This includes dam inspections, control of aquatic vegetation and the maintenance of docks, walkways, beaches, bridges, and trails.
- Miscellaneous expenses like National grid, Porta-Sans, Newsletter, and fees amount to another \$2000 annually.

The Budget for 2022, at right, illustrates, we are running on a very tight budget. Dues are \$250, a small price to pay for the many benefits of membership in the Northwoods Association. You recently received a dues invoice in the mail. Please make your payment by April 1. To ease the burden, you can opt to make 2 payments of \$125, due April 1 and July 1. Thank you for doing your share.

# **Lake Update**

As usual, our lakes have passed the CSLAP tests for 2021 and they are in excellent ecological shape. We have none of the common problems like invasive species, polluted water and harmful algal blooms. Thanks to all the residents who respect the lakes and help to monitor them for problems.

What can you do to maintain a healthy lake?

- Many invasive species hitchhike a ride from lake to lake.
  - Wash your boats with bleach after they have been in foreign waters.
- Limit the use of fertilizers. They leach into the lake and encourage the growth of algae and aquatic vegetation.



- Maintain your septic systems to keep the wastewater from seeping into the lake.
- Maintain a buffer of grasses and other vegetation along the shoreline to keep sand and soil from washing into the lake.

Nuisance aquatic vegetation has been a real problem lately. Our inability to draw down the lake during the cold winter months has inhibited our

ability to control them. We will be getting an estimate for cutting some of these weeds as soon as the ice is off the lake. With the extra money we made from logging we hope to be able to afford some relief.
